Marla: I was curious about Magdal Friend in the 1860 census of York, DuPage County, Illinois, age 3. She is not in the 1870 Chicago Berman Friend census. The census taker mis-spelled the name Friend. Magdal (could be short for Magdalena) must have died between 1860-70. So there were 9 Berman/Hannah children total. Who was Barbary Uppenheimer? Maybe a housekeeper. The original image shows her birthplace, I think, as Hesse Darmstadt same as Berman and Hannah.

Also attached is map of the road Gehaus to Darmstadt. Note also that Heidelberg, where Emanuel might have studied later on, is only a few miles south of Darmstadt. The main interest is that my Mandelbaums came from Gehaus in 1852 about the time that our Friends and my great grandmother Hanchen Darmstadter-Hambujer came from Darmstadt 100 miles away. Why? Was it the 1848 German revolution?

[After news broke of revolutionary victories in February 1848 in Paris, uprisings occurred throughout Europe, including the German states. Events began rolling on February 27 in Mannheim, where an assembly of the people from Baden adopted a resolution demanding a bill of rights. Similar resolutions were adopted in Württemberg, Hesse-Darmstadt, Nassau, and other German states.]
