THE SIXTH REGIMENT.

Lieut. A. J. Grayson, the foreman of the Madison Courier office, has just concluded through the columns of that steadfast old paper a very interesting history of the 6th Indiana regiment during its operations in West Virginia in the three months' service. Its perusal brings vividly to mind many sad and some pleasant memories of those stirring times. How distinctly we remember the excitement attendant upon the getting up of a company here, which went out with F. A. Jones as Captain—Jones, that gallant spirit that went through all the war. He then was a young lawyer with no practice here, for he had not been here long. He was severely wounded in West Virginia, but recovered, and went with zeal into the organization of the 39th Indiana, going in as Lieut. Colonel and coming out at the end of the war a brigadier general. He is now a prominent lawyer at Macon, and one of the leading men of North Missouri. Many of the "boys" are here and hereabouts, and to them will the history of the 6th regiment be intensely interesting.—Lieut. Grayson will issue it in cheap pamphlet form, and we presume it will have a large sale here.

We did drill awfully all over town in those days, and it was hard on Tom Gibson, who best understood the manual of arms. We drilled in houses and out of doors—everywhere. Whenever one man could get two others together he instantly formed them in line and commenced putting them through.—No man refused to drill but Joe Kling, he almost came to grief by refus-

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
